The AHYA board has incorporated the theme into the whole year with monthly challenges pushed through social media to create action within the youth community.

Many youth participated in these themes by posting, sharing, and commenting their experiences and actions. Some examples of monthly challenges included introducing yourself to someone new, supporting your barnmates, thanking show staff, and more. Although many of the activities planned for Youth Nationals had to be cancelled, some activities were able to continue.

Craft packages were distributed throughout the stalls and kids were able to create and decorate their pool noodle stick horses. The show also held a graduation ceremony for graduating youth, allowing them to have their time to shine, despite cancelled graduations. There was also ice cream available, thanks to our wonderful sponsors, and first time exhibitor ribbons were handed out.

Instead of hosting an in person convention, the AHYA Board of Directors created an online convention where youth members were able to learn about the Arabian Horse Youth Association as well as vote on the Executive Board. The 2020 and 2021 Executive Board is President Brooke Backlund, Region 10, and Vice President Grace Smith, Region 5.
